I am sure the great discussion will continue at the February meeting!

We had great participation in the *Show & Tell* section of our meeting. **Mark Baumes** started the session discussing the white oak 8-sided pencil holder he finished for the family desk. Mark worked to replicate the Stickley finish.

Jim Sanson made a New Year's resolution to clean-up his shop. The hinged box he showed was made from scrap found in the shop. The turned bowl was made from a piece left over from a checker board he previously constructed.

It may be January but **Wilbur Chatterton** is already working on toys for Christmas 2014. Using a pattern from the book *Old Fashioned Wooden Toys* by Edward Baldwin, Wilbur created the truck using some thick wood he had in the shop. For those interested, the book is available on Amazon.com.

Charles Trabold talked about the latest twisted cane he created. When he originally envisioned creating his twisted canes, Charlie noted he considered boiling the wood to twist it but determined that would not work. Instead he uses various files and other tools to carve out the twists.

New member **Ed Rantanen** has a son-in-law whose hobby is brewing beer. Ed built the maple beer tasting paddle as a gift for him. He noted that he violated the rule, *make a copy of your pattern*.

Unique pieces are generally presented by **Jim Yonkers**. This month Jim showed two pieces, an ash wood burned plate that sits perfectly on antlers. The plate was round before he applied the wood burning. But, as he enhanced the piece it went out of round. Jim's second piece was a cedar hollow crochet hook holder onto which he burned a fairy.

Bernd Krause showed the latest 2 dulcimers he completed based on orders received during the NYS Fair. One was of ambrosia curly maple, western red cedar, and mahogany while the other was red heart, maple, Sitka spruce, and mahogany. Discussion regarding preserving the red heart brilliant color resulted in a few suggestions.

Bill Noroski told the story of how helping a neighbor move an old chest to the curb for scrap resulted in his acquisition of a new chest while learning some techniques for removing stains from a wooden piece.

On October 30th, **Dick Powers** received a new lathe and tools for his birthday. After just a few months of learning, including a session with **Charlie LaPrease**, Dick showed 3 pieces he recently completed. He showed a bowl, goblet, and lidded box that his wife will use to hold tea bags. Dick glued up his blanks using cedar and cherry he had in the shop.

A cherry step stool was shown by **Tim Erwin**. Tim used hand-cut mortise and tenon joinery with a 10° angle to build this one and several others. Tim also showed a trivet he made using his router and a sweep jig.

Turners often find their project wood in the firewood. **Charlie LaPrease** found the ash he used to create his bowl while splitting firewood this past fall. After turning, Charlie applied a black dye, liming wax, and a final coat of lacquer.

Barbara Raymond-LaPrease showed the beaded cherry box she's working on. She designed the box to match the shape of the bead embroidery piece that is affixed to the lid. She also showed a squirrel onto which she burned designs and then applied different colors of DecoArt Metallic Lustre™.

One attendee suggested a session on dust collection for the club. His desire was taken to heart and transformed into our March 6th meeting topic for the full club.

Tony Baleno started out *Show & Tell* showing a picture of the *love* home accent, a gift for his son and his wife. The pattern is from Steve Good's website. He also showed and talked about the cherry and cottonwood monster truck, also a Steve Good pattern. Tony had the detailed instructions that Steve provides to make the truck and reiterated that when making something like this you need to read through the entire directions before starting to understand the process.

Several years ago **Jim Ireland** demonstrated kolrosing at a meeting. Ever since **Susan Allen** has wanted to learn it. For Christmas she received a kolrosing knife. Sue discussed two pieces she created using the knife – a letter opener and an ornaments. **Dan Brady** showed an urn box he recently completed for a client. Inside, the box had specific spaces for each dog's ashes. Dan noted that this is the 6th he's made, 4 for dogs and 2 for humans, and for every pound of the entity, you need 1 cubic inch of space in the box. **Charlie LaPrease** showed his wood burned and colored platter. **Barbara Raymond-LaPrease** showed her wood burned squirrel, a wood burned deer candle holder, and ornaments recently completed. She also showed a picture of ornaments custom ordered after the St. Rose sale.

The next meeting of the Scrolling Interest Group is **Wednesday, February 19th** at the Belgium Cold Springs Station 1 Community Room, 7920 River Road, Baldwinsville. **We will be talking about five different types of baskets – stepped, twisted, stacked, folding, and woven.** Don't forget your *Show & Tell* projects as well as any woodworking issues you are having. ✂




SHOP TIME: SAFETY FIRST!

Keeping your fingers away from blades and bit is an important safety rule. Last month we featured a push block designed to exert forward and downward pressure to push the workpiece through the blade and prevent chattering. This month we feature one to rip thin pieces safely and consistently at the table saw.



To use the saddle-style push block, simply set the rip fence to the width of the piece you want to cut and rip as many strips as you need from a wide board. This design straddles the rip fence and is made from a couple of pieces of hardboard and a hardwood spacer. (Note: Size the spacer to match the width of the rip fence.) One side of the block has a series of notches that “catch” the end of the workpiece. ✂
