## On The Road with Barb & Charlie – *The Fox Chapel Wood Show*

The last time [Fox Chapel Publishing](#) had an Open House at their East Petersburg, PA facility was 2006. It was well received and crowded. With scroll saw picnics cancelled, many scrollers and carvers on the online [forums](#) Fox Chapel sponsors pleaded with them to again hold an event. On May 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> the event was held but not at their offices. Rather, at the Rough & Tumble Engineers Historical Association in Kinzers, PA, just east of Lancaster. Charlie and I attended on Friday, the 9<sup>th</sup>.

Thursday was a nice day to drive and as we wound our way down to Intercourse, PA we saw many Amish farms, bikes, and buggies. We picked up some pretzels and mustard at the Pretzel factory then headed to the Rumspringa Brewing Company and Mount Hope Wine Gallery down Old Philadelphia Pike outside Bird-in-Hand. We left there with some adult beverages for us and **Bob Henry** and **Mike White** who were waiting at the hotel. We continued to *look around* the area, stopping to look around one group of shops. We arrived at the Best Western and were pleasantly surprised. The room was absolutely wonderful, roomy, and even had a refrigerator for the adult beverages and mustard. We met up with Bob and Mike and decided to have dinner at Miller's Smorgasbord. **Bob Casey** would have loved it! We all splurged on the smorgasbord once we got seated. We waited about 20 minutes because we had no reservations. At least they had *stuff* in their gift shop to look at. They even sold some laser cut ornaments that Mike and I laughed at.

Thursday evening, Charlie and I sat downstairs in the lounge at the hotel rather than hang out in our room. We had some nice chats with **Rolf Beuttenmuller** and his wife, **Carole Rothman** and her husband, and **Janette Square**, all instructors at the show. We also ran into a scroller who came from Wisconsin with her husband for the show.

After breakfast at the hotel on Friday, we headed over to Rough & Tumble. We had our tickets and wristbands so all we needed to do was park in some shade. The doors to the exhibit area were open so I hit the book sale. Bob wanted a book on veneering and inlay which I found in the *Scratch & Dent* area. His \$24.95 book was \$8 with little to no dents. I found some others, including a book of tattoo designs and a book of floral designs that can be used as scroll saw patterns. Charlie put the bag in the car and I headed to my first session. There were 10 possible sessions in each hour-long time frame with an hour between each session so you could attend 4 sessions in one day. I choose to attend two sessions by **Shawn Ferguson** on jigsaw puzzles, an advanced scrolling class by Rolf, and a shaping intarsia class by Janette.

What did Charlie do? He wandered about the grounds, chatted with people, watched demonstrations, periodically met up with me, and learned lots of things about steam engines (the focus of this facility). We met up at 5pm when I finished Janette's class. We left shortly thereafter and headed home, again moseying along back roads until we reached Rt 222. From there we headed back toward Allentown for the ride back north on the Northeast extension. We arrived home around 10:30pm after stopping just once after getting gas before getting on Rt 222.

It was a fun, informative day. A nice change of pace! Fox Chapel did a good job organizing the event considering *shows* are not their forte. The steam engine equipment made noise throughout the day but at the classes I attended the speakers were able to compensate for the noise. Thank goodness the sun stayed behind the clouds for most of the day as the tents were full. Did I learn anything? Lots!! Besides, you can rarely attend a class, demonstration, or any other educational opportunity without learning something. In between, Charlie and I met up, toured the vendor and play area, had lunch, and watched the lumber mill demonstration. ✂



## FYI: EQUIPMENT AT FAYETTEVILLE FREE LIBRARY

The **Fayetteville Free Library** has several tools – including a **laser engraver** – you can use for free if you have a library card for the Onondaga County Public Library system! What a great service! There is one requirement – you **MUST** take a 40 minute training session. Looking at the library website, they have several other tools in the library's *Fab Lab* – 4 3D printers, a 3D scanner, a vinyl cutter, a Cricut machine, sewing machines, handtools, and several different computers. Training sessions are needed for equipment other than the laser cutter so plan for it. ## SHOP TIME: ORGANIZING YOUR SHOP



We build lots of projects, acquiring tools and supplies in the process. Eventually, our shop gets crowded or we can't find things. What to do? Take some time out to organize your shop. The worst thing to organize are small parts and accessories. Here are a few tips to help you organize.

### Storage Rack for Drill Press Supplies:

Bevel a piece of plywood and add legs to stabilize the plywood. Holes and dowels are used to hold the various parts you have and keep your sanding attachments, chuck keys, and other accessories in plain sight whenever you need them. →


### Countersink & Drill Bit Organizer:

Use a block of wood to store different size drill bits with countersinks, corresponding pilot bits, and the Allen wrench you use to change the bits. Drill countersunk holes in a line at the front of your block that correspond to the bits on the block. Then rip away at the center of each hole so you can test screws! ↓



### Modular Router Bit Storage:

As you acquire router bits, you want to store them so they are not damaged. Make these blocks out of hardwood using 2" square pieces, drilling holes that match their shank size. Use dowels to hold extra collets. Place the blocks in a drawer. →



**Labeling!** If you have drawers or cupboards where you store your supplies, be sure to label the outside as to what is in each location. You may say, why? But when something you haven't used in a while disappears, your labels will help! ✂


### COMMUNITY SUPPORT: VOLUNTEERS NEEDED


## WOODWORKING EDUCATION: WOOD MOVEMENT

When we think of wood – constructed into a table, a bookshelf, a vessel, a box, or whatever – many assume it will remain more or less the same once it is completed. After all, the wood is dead, right? WRONG! Wood moves and in some cases, it can move significantly. And you must cope with movement in every project you build. Last month we talked about how moisture content affects movement. This month we finish with direction of movement, shape, and estimating wood movement. Is this useful? Let Barbara know!

### DIRECTION OF MOVEMENT

Although it's constantly expanding and contracting, wood does not move equally in all directions. The grain structure causes it to move differently in three different directions.

- Wood is fairly stable along its *longitudinal* direction, parallel to the grain. Green lumber shrinks only 0.01 percent of its length as it dries. An 8-foot-long board will move only 3/32 inch.
- Wood moves much more across the grain, *tangent* to the growth rings. Green lumber shrinks as much as 8 percent in this direction.
- But it shrinks only half as much (4 percent) in the *radial* direction, extending out from the pith along the radius of the growth rings. For this reason, quartersawn lumber is more stable than plain-sawn lumber. Quartersawn lumber is cut radially and moves only half as much across its width as plain-sawn lumber, which is cut tangentially.



*Wood is fairly stable along its length, moving only 0.01% as it loses its bound water. However, (on the average) it moves 8% tangentially and 4% radially.*


### CHANGING SHAPE

The difference in tangential and radial movement has other important consequences. Depending on how its cut from the tree, a board may change shape as it dries:

- If the annual rings run side to side in square stock, the stock will shrink to a rectangle.
- If the rings run diagonally from corner to corner, the stock will become diamond-shaped.
- Round stock becomes oval as the tangential diameter shrinks more than the radial diameter.
- Plain-sawn lumber tends to cup in the opposite direction of the growth rings because the outside face (the face farthest from the pith) shrinks a little faster than the inside face.
- In quartersawn lumber, both faces shrink equally and the board remains flat.

And there are other forces that may cause a board to move or change shape. Stress sometimes develops in the tree as it grows or in the lumber when it's improperly dried. Internally stressed wood (called **reaction wood**) moves when you cut it. Cutting relieves some of the stress, and the wood reacts by changing shape. This is quite different from normal wood movement, however. Once the stress dissipates, it no longer affects the wood. But there's nothing you can do to stop radial and tangential movement. As long as there's weather, the boards will continue to shrink and swell.


*Because of the difference in tangential and radial movement, boards change shape as they expand and contract. The way in which they change depends on how they are cut from the tree.*

## ESTIMATING WOOD MOVEMENT

It's also useful to know how much a board is likely to move. You must anticipate the movement when fitting drawers and doors, inserting panels in frames, and dozens of other operations.

The rule of thumb is that if the board shows mostly flat grain on its face, allow for 1/4 inch total wood movement for every 12 inches across the grain. If it shows mostly quarter grain, allow for 1/8 inch movement. This will accommodate an annual change of 8 percent moisture content — much more than is common in most areas.

Also consider the time of year. Wood shrinks to its smallest dimension in the winter and swells to its maximum in the summer. The wood in winter projects will expand; the wood in summer projects will contract. In the spring and fall, remember that the wood will expand half your total movement allowance and contract the other half. ✂



*Quartersawn lumber is more stable than plain-sawn, expanding only half as much across its width. Additionally, quartersawn boards remain relatively flat, while plain-sawn boards tend to cup when they expand and contract*

## MANUFACTURER REVAMPS TITEBOND GLUE LABELS

Many of us use Titebond® glue for our woodworking projects. Have you bought any recently? You might have noticed that the labels look different. That is because Franklin International, the manufacturer of Titebond glue has redesigned the labels "to make them easier to understand so you can buy with greater confidence". The familiar colors of original (red), ii Premium (blue), and iii Ultimate (green) are not changing. However, they've added a bar graph that tells you the strength, set time, cleanup, and water resistance (exterior use or interior use only).



**Don't forget to always date your bottles.** There is a shelf life for glue, just like with the eggs or milk you buy! Dating the bottle when you purchase will also give you an idea of how much you use over time. *It's a good thing.*
