DUDLEY FRASURE'S ADIRONDACK PACK BASKET

with Tim Wimmer

Reminder: Meeting starts at 6:30pm and is held at the Belgium Cold Springs Fire Station 1 Community Room, 7920 River Road, just southeast of Baldwinsville. Directions are on the back page and on the website.

A LITTLE HISTORY ... The Adirondack pack basket was made to accommodate all those outdoorsmen and woodsmen who carry loads on their backs. It took its name from the mountains where it was first made and used widely around 1850. Born in 1912 and having lived through the Great Depression after which work was scarce, Dudley Frasure built a cabin in the on Hunt Mountain above his parent's home in Sherburne, NY. As a source of income, he began building pack baskets using the ash he cut on the mountain. He would select the young ash trees in the spring and use a special machine – called the *Frasure Monstrosity* – to pound the log and separate the growth layers. Once separated, Dudley would peel off a sheet of the growth ring, cut it into strips, coil and soak them until ready to weave. Using a mold to shape it, the pack basket is fitted to the back so it was easier to carry.

Our speaker, **Mike Danial** gave a lively and informative presentation for the 90 or so people in attendance. Mike wove the five Stickley brothers – Gustav, Leopold, John George, Albert, and Charles – into and throughout the presentation as needed to tell stories of the “Stickley” furniture options from the brothers and their companies. He talked about the *shop marks* of each company, adding humorous stories of authenticity claims by callers. As Mike conveyed information, it was clear that he engaged the audience by their ongoing interactions and reactions. The current business, owned by the Audi family, grew from the earlier businesses, building on the best construction features from each brother while improving the quality of existing designs saved by Mike while helping clean areas of the original Fayetteville factory before an upcoming inspection. Well done Mike! Thanks for the great session! We’ll have you back soon – maybe January 2017 – to give your *care, restoration and finishing* talk. Oh, and thank you also for the additional raffle items that you brought – 3 boards, a couple shirts, and other items. Not surprisingly, two people passed up the cash in the raffle for the items you brought!



Prior to Mike’s presentation, we held our normal business meeting and then *Show & Tell*. Also, several members renewed their membership with Mark after making it to the

facility. Barbara noted that the traffic jam was related to Rt. 370 being shut down because a tanker truck overturned at 7:30am and was spread across the road from ditch to ditch.

The **Show & Tell** session had seven participants. **Bill Noroski** showed a wooden cup given to him as a Christmas gift by his new daughter-in-law. The cup was purchased in Japan and is an excellent example of woodturning.

Our family members are often the recipient of our woodworking hobby. In **Don Vanderveer’s** family, each child—whether it be the children or grandchildren—are the lucky ones. The maple and cherry jewelry box Don showed is for granddaughter #3. Using plans in Wood magazine as a guide, Don employed half lap construction, bread board ends on the lid, and jewelry box hinges that allow the lid to go just a small percentage past 90°. The hinge from Lee Valley, while pricey, is of solid brass and locks open. Don used blue crushed velvet to line the drawers, had her initial engraved in the lid, and finished it with four coats of wipe-on polyurethane

The January/February 2015 issue of *Woodworker’s Journal* contained plans to make an animated penguin toy. **Bob Norton** made several however when they moved they slipped. Warning: Penguin Recall! To prevent the slipping, Bob added rubber bands – like the ones around your celery bunch – to the wheels. Bob then also showed a few tools he used to sand the penguins when he originally constructed them.



Don't Forget Your Projects for the Cutoff Challenge



SHOP TIME: GLUE UP TIPS!

Here are some tips for making sure those glue ups go well.

- A. To Avoid Surprises – Do a Dry Run** – Check to see that you have the right size clamps, your joints come together tightly, and you have enough space on your workbench. Take a practice run at assembling your project. Lay out all your clamps with the jaw handles fully retracted, as well as any additional tools or clamping accessories you'll need, such as squaring braces. Go through the process of clamping the assembly as you would in real time, recording how long it takes from start to finish. This will tell you if you can complete the assembly before the glue sets. Make any needed adjustments to clamps or your process.
- B. Raise the Grain Now to Save Efforts Later** – Wiping away glue squeeze-out with a damp rag works great, but can also raise the wood grain — even if you've already sanded to 220 grit — leaving you additional sanding. This can be especially tricky in tight areas, such as the edge of the chair back in between slats. Wet these surfaces prior to assembly and let them dry, raising the grain. Then sand to a fine grit (220 should suffice). Now, wiping away glue squeeze-out won't raise the grain again.
- C. Get a Better Grip** – For small or slippery clamp handles, improve your grip by applying anti-slip tape. This self-adhesive tape, available at home centers and hardware stores, comes in rolls of various widths, with grit applied to one side.
- D. Don't Forget to Brush** – If you're like most of us, your highly technical glue-spreading device is attached to your hand. To avoid leaving gluey fingerprints on your projects, though, try using an old toothbrush to gently spread glue. Its soft bristles evenly disperse the glue, and later wash out cleanly with warm water.
