## OUR MARCH MEETING RECAP

On Wednesday, March 9<sup>th</sup> – one week later than normal – approximately 70 members and guests of the Sawdust & Woodchips Woodworking Association met in the Community Room at the Belgium Cold Springs Fire Station One. Our speaker **Andy Newhouse** gave an excellent presentation about the history of, and current status of the American chestnut. Work to develop a blight resistant tree has gone on for 20-25 years, heavily supported by the American Chestnut Foundation. Andy is currently a PhD student at SUNY ESF who is working on the issue along with his mentors, Dr. William A. Powell and Dr. Charles A.

Maynard. Thank you Andy for a wonderful presentation! It contained just the right amount of technical information and common information. I know that everyone loved it and I learned a ton! We hope you come back to our meetings in the future. Maybe you will learn more woodworking skills!

**Show & Tell:** Prior to Andy's excellent presentation, we had a long *Show & Tell* session with 11 participants.

**Mitch Wilson** started us out. It was good to see Mitch back after an issue with his hip. His project? A cabinet to hold his woodworking DVDs. Mitch constructed the cabinet using squirrely hickory, used wedged thru mortise & tenon joints, and added several coats of Tru-oil.



One of our new scrollers, **Peter**

showed a pair of mahogany bookends that have wolves on them. He finished the bookends with Danish oil.



**Breese**

The Central New York Woodturners are preparing boxes that will be distributed at Golisano to children undergoing extreme medical care. The boxes will be used to hold beads given to the children throughout their treatment. The program is called *Beads of Courage*. **Bob Norton**



showed an octagon cherry and maple box he created as a donation for the effort. He showed this box, noting it was the most fun thing in a long time that he designed and built. Bob also showed a piece of jelutong and explained its use and history.

**Mic Jenkins** lives along NYS Rt 370. When a guy totaled his car upon hitting a deer in front of his home last Thanksgiving, the owner only wanted the rack. Mic



mounted it on a piece of walnut. Mic also showed a cheese board



of walnut with poplar inlays. For the finish, he used a PolyWhey, a water-based finish that has 25% less VOC content and uses whey (a by-product of the dairy industry) as the bonding agent.

**Jim Yonkers** built himself an ash shooting stick, a tripod for holding a gun while hunting wild boar. Jim made the holder from scrap leather and snaps.

Furniture is often made to fit spaces in their creator's homes. **Kevin Rawlings** had a space in his backroom and built a honey locust bench to fill it. He made it 20" tall and used stub thru tenons in its construction.



**James Sanson** assembled a bunch of scraps to make a "board to hold things". It's likely that this board will hold an IPAD or other tablet.

Another of our new scrollers, **Bob Ward** showed a group of pieces he recently completed. Bob took up scrolling a year ago to reduce his stress. His wife often goes to bed without him as he's downstairs creating beautiful pieces like these.



Tables can be heirlooms or just pieces of furniture that bring lots of memories. In **Verne Montana's** family, a marble top table made by Charles Eastlake was a special table in the family home. In 2013, Verne began to build 3 similar tables – one for each of his 2 kids and one for his home – all while battling pancreatic cancer. Verne showed all 3 tables and told much of his story to the group. Note that each table has a space under the marble top to house memorabilia.



One of our visitors, **Deanna Gates** show two pieces, a turned vase with colorful tulips and a small cutting board. The cutting board is finished with mineral oil. Welcome Deanna and thanks for showing some of your work. We hope you will return, join, and continue to show pieces.



Our final presenter was **Chad Dawson**. Dr. Dawson showed a turned vessel of wormy chestnut recovered from a 200 year old barn beam. After reviewing the rings in the original beam, Chad figures the tree was 120 years old when it was taken down so the tree itself was likely planted in 1790. The insert was added after the vessel was turned using a balloon method.

## SCROLLING INTEREST GROUP MEETING

SWWA's Scrolling Interest Group met on Wednesday evening, March 16<sup>th</sup>. We had just four participants in the Show & Tell but a lively discussion regarding the projects shown by **Tony Baleno**, **Peter Breese**, **Gene Piasecki**, and **Barbara Raymond-LaPrease**.



Following a break, we discussed the bowl presses (see photo) and the next steps in creating a scrollsawn bowl. Then, **Bob Henry** provided everyone with a collection of tips for making a bowl (below). Also, **Bill Noroski** discussed his experiences making 3 bowls. Bill admitted that reading all the instructions may have helped.

Our next meeting is **Wednesday, May 18<sup>th</sup>**. **Tony Baleno** will be talking about using a router to enhance your projects and we will discuss experiences making a scrolled bowl. See you there! ✂

### Bob's Tips:

- Best wood – poplar, pine, aspen, mahogany – go to expensive and denser woods after you've made a few bowls & have it under control.
- Best size – 4" – 10" – depends on press size!
- Glue is set before you put in press; press is for even pressure over time
- Find & mark your dead center on the blank before starting to cut
- Wood must be flat
- If using a drum sander, run thru one more time without changing height
- Check thickness after sanding to verify your angle. Use Scrollmania site to help setting angle.
- If possible use an electronic caliper to check thickness & check more than one area.
- Before cutting your bowl, use a test piece and cut a drawn line on an angle to get a feel for cutting on such sharp angles.
- Remember, it is harder to saw at an angle and you will likely push harder which will cause your blade to drift.
- Use plenty of glue when assembling – "rub joint".
- Be careful sanding so you don't create waves. Start as low as you need – if you need 60 grit, start there.
- Don't put bottom on until after the inside is completely sanded. Heck it is even easier to sand the outside first also!
- Return your saw to 0° after cutting; test a cut at 0° before making your next cuts



**NOTE:** To see the classes, go to the website, on the drop down for *2016 Wood Show Information*, select *2016 Classes*. Below the photo are the large words *Classes 2016* – click on those words and the list of classes will appear! Also, save time — plan to bring a signed Activities Waiver. Click on *Activities Waiver* and download/print the waiver form from the page that appears. This is required to attend classes.

The website lists several lodging options in the area. There are lots of other sights to see in this very historic and interesting area and the website gives you some links to the other venues. If you have a spouse going with you, the one day entrance fee is \$5. With that fee, you can visit this great 33 acre site with lots of hit & miss engines, steam trains, tractors, demonstrations, and even a saw mill. They can also see the exhibitors but cannot sit in on the seminars. From Syracuse, the trip is about 5 hours if you take Route 81 south to Route 476 (the Northeast Extension).



## SHOP TIME: Routing Mortises & Band Saw Tenons

Build this easy-to-use jig to help you cut **mortises** with your router. Use a spiral upcut bit for mortising. Allow the jig to move along the workpiece without obstruction. Always do a step process when mortising – cut in multiple passes at about  $\frac{1}{4}$ " per cut. Plunge just inside the end line and work back to the layout line. To help find your end, clamp a stop block to the workpiece. Once your mortises are cut, cut and fit your tenons. Make a simple jig for the band saw with an adjustable stop like that shown in the photos.

## On the Road

### *The Annual Shaker Box & Plane Making Classes*

Another month and I was *On-the-Road* again. This time it started on Friday, March 4<sup>th</sup>. About 1pm **Eric Pintar** called to tell me that he and **John Wilson** had arrived at the Super 8 Motel in Pulaski. I told them to get some rest as they started out at 4am from Charlotte, Michigan. YES, it was time for the 22<sup>nd</sup> year of our annual Shaker Box Class! John says we are the longest continuous running class – 22 years and counting! THANKS TO ALL OF YOU WHO HAVE SUPPORTED THIS THRU THE YEARS.

I headed north about 3pm expecting to meet John and Eric at the motel. Luckily I called 10 minutes before my arrival to find out they were already headed to Lakeshore Hardwoods to get set up. I headed there to help. When I arrived, they were talking to **Brian Leary**, our host for the weekend. We unloaded the vehicle and worked with John and Eric to set up the work area as they liked it.

The 15 attendees arrived by 6pm, anxious to get going. I introduced John and he started another great weekend. John spent time educating the group on the history of boxes, why and how they were used, etc. He then got folks started making their boxes; showing them how to cut the band, soak it in the hot water, bend it, tack it, and put the shapers in. Once instructed, 15 people went on to do the same thing. The beginners were all making 5 boxes while the 3 advanced folks built divided carriers, larger boxes, and presentation boxes. Many took right off and did great, a few had problems but by 10 most everybody was confident, had at least 3 box bands drying, and were proud of their work. At 10pm we called it a night with plans to be right at it again at 8am Saturday morning. John and Eric headed for the hotel. I headed home for some much needed rest and to pick up a sander we needed.



I meet up with John and Eric at the diner at 6:30am. After a nice breakfast, we headed to Lakeshore Hardwoods to get ready for the class which was to start at 8am. We arrived and found some of our energetic students already sanding their boxes. Everybody was there by 8am and continued where they left off Friday night. About 10am everybody sat down for more instruction from John and the final assembly steps. Everyone worked hard until a lunch of Jreck Subs arrived. Some people sat and ate while

some ate and worked at the same time. **John Meloling** joined us and took some great photos. Thank you, John.

As the afternoon wound down folks completed their boxes, we talked, and John handed out certificates. Attendees headed home with their boxes, ready to complete their sanding and add a finish. We all had a great time with many expressing a desire to come back next year.
