## PRESIDENT'S CORNER

SWWA's membership runs the calendar year. Therefore, it is time to start processing renewals. Please bring your pre-completed membership forms to the January meeting along with your membership fee or mail it to the address below.

The cost of membership has remained stable for many years. First time single members pay \$28 which includes a name badge. Single renewals are \$25. You can also select a couples membership for \$41 initially (includes 2 name badges) and \$35 for renewals.

Whenever possible, newsletters are sent by email which means you get your newsletter quicker, in color, and at a lower cost to the club. We do still send the newsletter by mail if members do not have an email address and have newsletters available at most meetings. Visitors are sent a newsletter for one month after their visit. ## JANUARY'S MEETING RECAP!

Members of the Sawdust & Woodchips Woodworking Association met on Wednesday, January 4<sup>th</sup> for their monthly meeting in the Community Room at Station One of the Belgium Cold Springs Fire Department. About 80 people attended.

Our featured speaker was Mike Danial, the historian at L&JG Stickley Inc. of Manlius. Rather than his usual topic for our meeting, Mike talked about furniture care, restoration and finishing while peppering in a variety of incredibly funny, but informative stories. Mike noted that Stickley is noted for the uniformity in its finishes. He is often called upon to "fix" finishes that customers have "issues" with. For example, when a dinner party among two sisters suddenly went bad from a gravy boat "accidentally" spilled on the table, Mike attended to the problem area under the supervision of the husband. When the spot was fixed, he used a bit of subterfuge to make the wife overly happy – they turned the table 180°! [Funnier when he told it!]

Some important points ... Stickley Dressing is what Mike recommends to clean furniture. This product can only be purchased at a Stickley store location but call ahead for availability. If you have furniture issues, you can email [care@stickley.com](mailto:care@stickley.com) for detailed instructions and tips. Also, if you use Facebook, check out *The Stickley Museum*. There are routine interesting posts about the history of Stickley but you will also find out about upcoming events at the Museum, like the *Roadshow* session on Thursday, February 9<sup>th</sup> at 7pm!

Mike provided many other tips on topics such as sweat & body oil on wood, sun damage, banana polish, glass tops, and table pads as he worked through showing that you can use variety of techniques to break down a bad finish and then build it up. Another great evening with Mike!



Before Mike's presentation, we held our usual Show & Tell session and had another unusual but wonderfully educational group of projects displayed and discussed by the participants.

**Jim Yonkers** started us out showing a reproduction Viking lap clamp he created. He assumes a clamp like this would be used to process bones. He also showed two wooden pin vises.



**Bob Casey** is doing more turning and showed a set of salt and pepper shakers he created of maple for the salt shaker and walnut for the pepper shaker. He created quite a few for family Christmas presents using a kit purchased from [Craft Supplies USA](#).

Using a pattern from a 2014 *Wood* magazine and wood from a hickory tree that used to stand in his yard, **Dave Stowe** created a beautiful bench using floating tenons. He was supposed to use mortise and tenons throughout but when building it he forgot to do the math correctly. The size of the bench is based on what he can handle.

Several past newsletters have spoken about **Bill Noroski's** grandson who lives in Japan and married a lovely Japanese girl. They have a precious daughter and Bill regularly receives photos. He showed a few of those photos that he translated into mementos for family. For one particular photo of the baby crawling, he cleverly translated that photo into what looks like the baby climbing a wall! Bill also showed a Steve Good ornament he translated into a plaque.

**Kevin Rawlings** has owned the top for the oak table he showed for many years. Finally he created this table which is 42 inches wide by 30 inches high. He's still putting the finish on it and was looking toward the evening's talk to assist him with the process.

Two cherry bowls and two cherry boxes were discussed by **John Meloling**. Having retired in 2016, John has spent some time getting about 160 bowl blanks ready for the lathe. One of the bowls he showed was turned today in less than 2 hours. For a finish, John used a common trifecta self-made finish – a combination of equal parts boiled linseed oil, denatured alcohol, and shellac.

**Mitch Wilson** showed a unique item – fruit basket shelves – a design he created of scrap wood to hold flat fruit baskets in the kitchen. The piece has 51 joints for which he used 102 Miller dowels and diagonal wedges in thru-tenons. He added an interesting twist – banana hooks. The finish is Tru Oil which is used on gunstocks.

Another small group of interested parties attended the Scrolling Interest Group meeting on Wednesday, January 18<sup>th</sup>. After *Show & Tell*, **Barbara** discussed a variety of topics including organizing your project cutting, adjusting pattern sizes, jigs & templates to facilitate better projects, and other topics.

Our *Show & Tell* session was quite small. **Tony Baleno** showed three sets of earrings depicting the Chinese words for Love, Strength, and Family. He cut these for his wife using rosewood and red heart. He stack cut and only buffed the final pieces. The pattern is Steve Good's pendant pattern printed at 60%. Tony also showed a desktop accessory, again a pattern from Steve Good's website ([here](#)). This cherry piece is perfect for the upcoming holiday as it depicts love.

**Mike White** showed an old acrobatic bear that he constructed several years ago. Mike demonstrated how it works and then experienced a *whoops* when the old fishing line he used broken.



Last, **Barbara** showed two ornaments she had left over from her Christmas cuttings. She noted that she also completed four puzzles, a circus train, an articulating alligator, and several pairs of earrings.

*Some notes.* First, there is no additional membership fee to attend the meetings; everyone can attend. Second, you do not have to know anything about scrolling or participate in the challenges to come to a meeting. There is always some great discussion that brings out tips that can be used with all woodworking. 



## SHOP TIME: Molding Clamping Trick

Applying molding to a project adds detail to and softens transitions on furniture projects. And often, the profile of the molding helps define the style of the project. Since the molding attracts so much attention, you want to make sure it's installed right. For small cabinets and shelves, gluing the molding in place is a great option. One place that can trip you up is holding the molding in place while the glue dries. The



profile makes it difficult to apply a clamp. In addition, the case top or bottom may get in the way of adding a clamp. One good solution is to make a flexible clamp caul like you see here.

The caul is made from a narrow strip of 1/4" hardboard. The caul allows you to apply a clamp away from the cabinet bottom and extend just the right amount of pressure on the molding. At the router table, round the ends of the caul to create a softer contact point. This keeps the caul from marring the molding. ✂

### NWA SHOWCASE/TOTALLY TURNING

The 26<sup>th</sup> annual fine woodworking show – *Showcase* – put on by the Northeastern Woodworker's Association (NWA) will be held at the Saratoga Springs City Center on **April 1 -2 from 10am to 5pm** daily. The featured demonstrators for 2017 are **Doug Stowe, Bob Van Dyke, and Ernie Conover**. A schedule for the demonstrations is not yet available. Concurrently, the turners of NWA will host their *Totally Turning* 2017 event with **Trent Bosch, Jimmy Clewes, David Ellsworth, Chris Pytlik, and Curt Theobald**, as 5 of the featured demonstrators.

Many folks ask, *can I enter my woodworking in the Showcase Gallery?* I am not a member of NWA. The answer – **Yes!** To enter your piece in the Gallery, there are two requirements.

The first is to fill out the form [here](#) and send it to event staff by **March 24<sup>th</sup>**. When filling out the form, you must remember that you can enter multiple categories but only one piece per category will be judged. The categories are on the form.

The second requirement is that you must deliver your piece between 3pm and 6:45pm on Friday, March 30<sup>th</sup>. Oh, a third requirement is that you cannot remove the piece from the Gallery before 5pm on Sunday.

Wait, I want to enter the *Totally Turning Instant Gallery*.

Ok, there are two differences – first you don't fill out the form because you will register your pieces upon arrival but before 6pm on Friday if you want the pieces judged.

And, second, there is no limit on the number of items you can enter.

You may deliver on Saturday or Sunday but then the pieces will not be judged.

What are the categories for Totally Turning? They are not yet listed on the website.

Going to the event for the weekend? Make your reservations **today**. There is a discount rate at the Saratoga Hilton adjacent to the event. There is a Hampton Inn down the hill from the City Center. Check the event [website](#) for more information on discount codes. ✂
