Most of us light our workshops with fluorescent tubes. This type of lighting can flicker noticeably and produce uneven light that may bother you or even result in odd finishing results. The Scrolling Interest Group met on Wednesday, May 17th for its final meeting before our summer hiatus. As usual, we had a great discussion focused on tips for better scrolling. Our group was small as was our *Show & Tell*.

Peter Breese presented four different scrolled pieces. One piece was a 33" wind twister he constructed of cherry, oak, maple, and walnut. The spinner pieces are mounted on a 3/8" dowel. He created the jig shown to facilitate drilling. He purchased the pattern from [Scroller](#) and has also constructed several of different sizes. The cherry ornate fretwork cross is 1/2" thick. The walnut and maple candle holder is a Steve Good pattern from his [Scrollsaw Workshop website](#). The celebration of mother plaque is oak that Peter needed to flatten a bit first. He added the walnut angels and a Baltic birch backer.

which he painted a menacing sky. The *Indian Maiden* is an old *Creative Woodworks & Crafts* pattern. The wood was given to him and it was a perfect use of this piece of butternut. Ron's final piece is a cherry and spalted maple basket. He used a pattern from Steve Good to cut it.

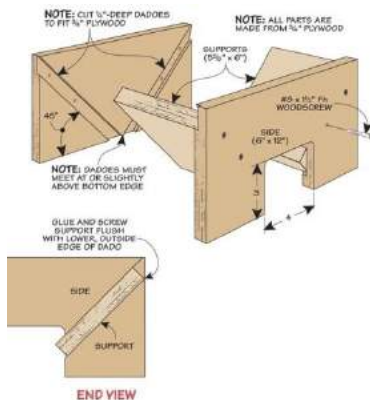

SHOP TIME: Table Saw Jig for Strong Miters!

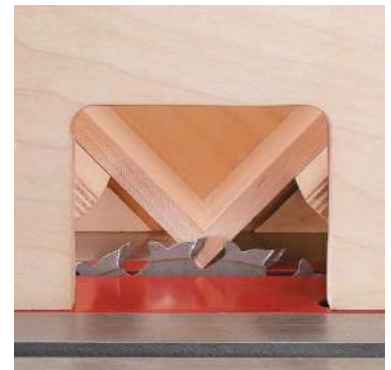

Nothing beats the clean look of mitered corners on a box. But the mitered corners won't stand up to a lot of stress. So if the box is going to be handled much, reinforce the corners by adding thin strips of wood called splines. Although you can hide these splines in grooves cut in the faces of the miters, exposed splines add interest. The trickiest part of the process is creating the kerfs in the corners of a box. To cut across the joint, the box has to be held at 45° to the saw's table. To do this safely, build a cradle-style jig that runs along the rip fence.



The jig starts out as two sides cut from $\frac{3}{4}$ " plywood. To hold the box, there are a couple of supports that fit into angled dadoes cut in the sides. Before screwing the sides to the supports, cut a small *window* in one of the sides. This makes it a lot easier to set the height of the blade and to position the rip fence later.

With the jig complete, you're ready to cut the kerfs. For this, you want to use a rip blade so the bottom of the kerf is perfectly flat. And in most cases, you want to cut the kerf as deep as possible without cutting through the inside corner of the box where the spline would show. An easy way to set the depth of cut is to look into the window and raise the blade until it's just below ($\frac{1}{16}$ " to $\frac{1}{8}$ ") the inside corner.



The next step is to position the fence to locate the kerf. After removing the box, just slide a ruler into the window so it rests against the inside face of the cradle. Then adjust the rip fence until the measurement matches the desired location of the kerf. Cutting the kerfs is just a matter of pushing the cradle over the saw blade. The important thing is to make sure the box stays tight against the inside face of the cradle as you press the cradle against the rip fence.

Note: If you experience any chip out, you can slip a piece of hardboard beneath the box to back up the cut. Just be sure to reset your depth of cut. ✂

WOODWORKING EDUCATION: Calculating Board Feet

Being able to calculate board feet is helpful when ordering or buying wood so you know what you are paying, or should be paying for a given amount of material.

It can also be helpful when figuring out how much of a specific type or size of wood is needed for a project.

Keep in mind that most sellers round up at least the actual thickness. Say you have a 3/4"-thick piece of dimensioned lumber. For these calculations, it is 1"-thick. The same happens to 7/8"-thick rough lumber which also is calculated using a 1"-thickness.

For the most part, the actual width and length are used to determine board feet but if a price looks odd or is more

that your calculations come up with, ask how the seller arrived at the board feet. You might be surprised.

The most common formula uses the thickness and width in inches and the length in feet. For example, a 1" by 6" by 5-feet long equals 2.5 board feet.

$$1" \times 6" \times 5' / 12 = 2.5 \text{ board feet}$$

You can also use inches in place of the "foot" dimension. This is common when buying rough-cut hardwood but you might see it anywhere eventually.

Figuring that same 1" by 6" by 5-foot long piece of wood would look like this:

$$1" \times 6" \times 60" / 144 = 2.5 \text{ board feet.}$$

MORE WOODWORKING EDUCATION:

Hardwood & Softwood Grade Definitions

While these grading definitions are generally accepted nationwide, always inspect the wood you buy closely to determine its appropriateness for the intended use!

Hardwood Lumber Grading

FAS	Highest grade in hardwood lumber. FAS graded boards must be at least 6" wide and 8' long. FAS boards have to yield 83 $\frac{1}{3}$ % in the defined clear face cuttings. FAS graded wood is commonly used for molding and millwork.
1C	Number 1 common is the "cutting" grade of hardwood lumber, often used in furniture and cabinetry. Number 1 common boards must yield 66 $\frac{2}{3}$ % in the designated clear face cuttings.
2C	Number 2 common boards must yield 50% in the designated cuttings. In 2A grade, cuttings must be clear; 2B grade allows sound (tight knots etc.) cuttings. #2 grades are often used in cabinets, flooring and some furniture.
3A	Another hardwood grade used primarily in flooring, furniture frames and pallets. 3A must yield 33 $\frac{1}{3}$ % in the designated cuttings.
2C and Better	The entire grade mix of all Number 2 common and FAS the log will yield.
WHAD	Worm holes with a defect
WHND	Worm holes (unlimited) no defect

Hardwood Lumber Sizes

4/4 - 1" thick

5/4 – 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ " thick6/4 – 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ " thick

8/4 - 2" thick

Softwood Lumber Grades

No. 1 (Construction)	Moderate-sized tight knots. Takes paint well. Often used for cornice, paneling, siding, shelving, and some furniture.
No. 2 (Standard)	Knots are larger and more numerous. Takes paint reasonably well and has uses similar to No. 1.
No. 3 (Utility)	Splits and knotholes present. Does not paint well. Used for crates, sheathing, subflooring and small (usually hidden) furniture parts.
No. 4 (Economy)	Numerous splits, knotholes and large waste areas. Does not take paint well and often relegated to sheathing, subflooring and concrete form work.
No. 5 (Economy)	Larger waste areas and coarser defects. Does not take paint and has applications similar to No. 5.
