

JUNE'S MEETING RECAP!

Members of the Sawdust & Woodchips Woodworking Association gathered on Wednesday, June 7th for their monthly meeting in the Community Room at Station One of the Belgium Cold Springs Fire Department. About 70 people attended.

Our topic for the evening was *lighting conversions*, focused on converting your fluorescent lights to LED. **Tony Baleno** walked us through the process, modifying one of the lights from his shop. Prior to the demo, Tony discussed options for replacing incandescent, compact fluorescent, and tube fluorescent. Focused on tube conversions, he then noted two different options – plug & play LED tubes and end-fed LED retrofit tubes. For the demo,



he reconfigured his fixture by showing us how to remove the ballast and rewire it to use end-fed LED retrofit tubes. Great job Tony! Thanks.

Before Tony's demonstration, we had a small but interesting *Show & Tell* session. Remember, Barbara set a challenge for every member to present at least one item during *S&T* in 2017. For the Scrollers, that includes *S&T* in the Scrolling Interest Group meetings!



Bruce Meissner started our June S&T showing a cherry mallet with a brass end. He challenged attendees to identify where he found the brass end. Give up? Bruce recently replaced the kitchen faucet. The brass is the weight that was on the hose for the faucet sprayer. A great example of reusing parts!

What can you make with old cedar fence posts? Hmm, when

it is **Jim Yonkers** that has the wood, you know it will be interesting! This time, its 3 *Ridiculous Chickens*! Needless to say, Jim created something very



unique. Each of the ladies has eggs, whether they be painted on or they are loose and incorporated into their body! What a delightfully fun piece!

Bob Casey is building some Shaker style chairs. To do so, he must turn several tenons on a variety of pieces. The tenons need to be the same size. Using the internet as a resource, Bob found a video by Captain Eddie on You Tube that showed how to make a tenon cutter from a wrench. After watching it, Bob transformed an open ended 1/2" wrench into the tenon cutter shown in the picture.



George Lorifice has piano player friends in Las Vegas that are called Twin Keys. George created a bread board with a piano key inlay to remember them. He talked about and showed the way he created the inlay. Beautiful!



Dick Powers recently purchased a new lathe. He used it to turn the candy dish of bloodwood, maple, and walnut but wasn't happy with the finish. He asked the group for some advice which of course was provided.





Don Vanderveer is a very giving grandfather. Recently, his grandson graduated from RIT. As with all significant family events, Don created a gift for the

grandson to commemorate the occasion – a unique walnut and ash *prairie-grass* desk lamp. Using plans from the September 2015 *Wood* magazine, Don finished the lamp with polyurethane and incorporated a battery operated led light into the lamp.

Marine stores carry wooden paddles but **Paul Zinzer** decided to build a beavertail style paddle. He created the pattern and laid it out on a 2 x 8 douglas fir board. He then used an electric plane to shape the paddle, adding some curves to the design hoping to get better water movement. Paul admits he could have used a spoke shave to help shape it. Maybe next time!

We had thought about bringing the treadle scrollsaw and spring pole lathe but the weather was scheduled to be hot – and it was hot and also very humid. We did bring out the antique scrollsaw owned by the Historical Society and got it working for them. We were busy on Saturday but Sunday only had a few visitors. We had four people who expressed interest in the clubs. While Sunday was mostly a bust, we were around for the big branch that fell off a large maple tree across the street. And, **Chris Malmgren**, the Director was very thankful for our participation.




SHOP TIME: Router Table Sled!

The router table can be a very useful tool for producing all kinds of profile and joinery work. However, when routing smaller items, it can be dangerous with large openings that can catch your piece. Make this sled to help you make safe cuts with your router! The sled holds the workpiece so it acts like a larger piece. The larger sled makes it easier to push the workpiece past the bit and keeps your fingers clear of the bit. To hold the piece against the base, use a modified toggle clamp. Replace the small rubber end of the clamp with a wide "foot" to give added surface area for the clamp to grip the workpiece. Also replace the upper nut with a star knob to make adjusting the height of the foot quick and easy. ✂
