## OUR JANUARY 2018 MEETING

Our guest speaker for January, **Mike Danial**, the historian for L. & J. G. Stickley, Inc., used a variety of physical artifacts to educate the audience about how woodworking projects can tell wonderful stories in his presentation entitled *The Story is as Important as the Object!* Each artifact that was presented contained at least one cool story, some including real, fake, or somewhat fake marks claiming their place in Stickley history (or did they?). As Mike finished his presentation, he left the group with two challenges. First, he noted that people who create projects need to not only sign and date their pieces, but also provide a story about why the piece was created. Hey, you never know who in your family will be the ultimate recipient of your piece 25, 50, or even 100 years from now and will want to know! Second, while we all love to make our projects look perfect, take one project and make it look like it's been around for a long time.



Barbara of course adds a third challenge – bring your pieces to meetings to share with others! We had a small *Show & Tell* session in January with just eight people participating. Her challenge is to see at least one piece per member during the year. Regular meetings, scrolling interest group meetings, and the year-end Woodworker's Challenge all count. Bring it on!

Our first presenter was **Steve Flood**. Recently, Steve's grandkids were over to the house and he worked with them to turn an ice cream scoop and bloodwood pen. The pen will go to his son-in-law who was recently promoted to major. Steve noted that he had steps for the kids to stand on, had the kids follow all safety rules, and worked very closely with them to insure there would be no issues.



Our "unusual project" guy, **Mitch Wilson**, was up next. Mitch, an avid cook, showed a walnut and purpleheart kitchen sliding entertainment shelf with a drop down Ipad/Tablet holder. This is another of Mitch's original designs. The walnut was procured at the May 2017 auction. He used Tru Oil as a finish.



Scrolled shelf accessories are becoming one of **Bill Noroski's** specialties. He showed two, one Santa and one of his grandson's wedding proposal. Not without a story to go with the proposal picture, Bill told us how the event hit some hiccups but finally happened.



**Bill Keller** took a class on veneering in New Hampshire. While taking the class, he created his spinning susan using curly maple, zebrawood, and walnut veneer. His finish is Behlen's gel with Renaissance wax.


Next up was our *Create from Anything* member, **Jim Yonkers**. Jim showed his latest bird creation made from pine and cedar. Your editor thinks he named it, but can't be sure. Jim also showed a small box he created from scrap wood found in the pile!

At the January meeting, **Bruce Swift** showed one of those projects – the folding stool. Bruce used select pine for his project

## SHAKER BOX & PLANE MAKING CLASSES MARCH 9-11, 2018 AT LAKESHORE HARDWOODS

For the 24<sup>th</sup> year there will be a class in Upstate NY on making Shaker Oval boxes and plane making. Beginners & Advanced Shaker Box Classes run simultaneously on Friday from 6pm to 10pm and on Saturday from 8:30 am to 5pm. The Plane Making Class runs Sunday from 8:00am to 4pm. All materials are provided for each class at a nominal cost.

Participants in the Beginners Shaker Box class produce 5 complete Shaker boxes, sizes 0-4. Advanced Shaker Box Class participants pick their projects from many different options including the oval tray, music box, handle basket, jewelry box, presentation box, or any of the sizes of legacy Shaker boxes. The options are many. Plane Making Class participants can make a BLOCK PLANE, CHISEL PLANE, SCRUB PLANE or SHOULDER PLANE.

The instructor travels from Michigan to teach the class. The cost is \$150 per class plus materials (\$30-\$40 estimated).

## ON THE ROAD: THE SPRINGFIELD, MASS WOODWORKING SHOW 2018

Bob Casey, our roving reporter sends this report of his recent trip.

Hey everybody, it is 2018 and it is January 12<sup>th</sup>. It is winter and it is time to get the heck out of town. No not to Florida, not to Arizona, and not to Hawaii. If I want to stay warm I stay in the shop. No, it is time for my annual trip to Springfield, Massachusetts to attend *The Woodworking Show!*

It is 7:15am and it is 55 degrees. **Peter Oster** came by and picked me up and we were on the way. (I asked Peter to drive this year. I guess for these longer trips I feel safer if someone else drives. Thank you, Peter) It was warm for January and it was raining. So this is Syracuse; you want perfect weather of 75° and sunny, either move or wait till August 9<sup>th</sup> or so. Oh well.

Like I said Peter picked me up; we missed some others that usually travel to the shows with us, but they had other commitments today. Beside the rain, the trip was uneventful. We made one rest stop as Peter needed coffee and we arrived in Springfield about 1 hour before the show opening time of noon, but that was the idea.

The weather report said it was going to start snowing late afternoon early evening and we wanted to get home safely. We stopped at the local Woodcraft store which is just down the street from the Big E where the show is held. We shopped around and I now kick myself for not purchasing some purpleheart planks that were 4" x 24" x ¾" that they had in cart up front. But that's OK. I texted **Bill Shea**, an SWWA member who lives in Dalton Mass (we only see him when he works at State Fair or at the Christmas Party). He was planning on going to the show Sunday so I asked him to check them out and buy me 5 if they still have some. After Woodcraft, we went across the street to the White Hut and had lunch – my favorite – burgers, fries, and a soda. After lunch, we headed down the street and arrived at the show about noon.

As is usually the case, we say *see you* and go our separate ways. First, I dropped off some flyers for the Shaker Box/Plane making class at the Lakeshore Hardwoods booth. Thank you **Brian Leary** for distributing the flyers. Then I had some things I needed to purchase from Lee Valley. They are great! While it's not instant gratification, you put your order in, pay no tax, pay no

shipping and what you order gets shipped to you! So, when I need anything from them, I just make a list and get it at the show.

One of the skills I am trying to improve in 2018 is turning. **Bradley McCalister**, a turner, was giving a free seminar on turning miniatures and I wanted to see what he was doing at 12:30.

I sat down and he asked the attendees if someone had an idea what he should turn. Someone said a Christmas tree. He said he'd never done that but would give it a try. The piece came out nice I think, and he painted it green and sprinkled glitter all over it. Check out the picture. It stands about 4-5" tall.



I went and talked to some more vendors I wanted to see, and then ended up in one of my usual spots talking to **Alex Snodgrass** of Carter Band Saw products about cutting boards.

Peter and I decided to get on the road a little earlier than normal so we could get home before the predicted storm. 

## SHOP TIME: Workbench Tool Rack

**D**o you hunt for the simple tools needed to work on a project at the bench? Why not construct one of these and attach it to the side?


The rack is a plywood box with a back made from pegboard for extra tool storage. A pair of holders inside the box accepts chisels and screwdrivers. And a tray at the top corrals other items you want to keep handy. The rack mounts to the side of the bench with heavy-duty slides.

After sizing the parts, cut dados in the sides for the top, bottom, and tool holders. Then cut a groove in the top, bottom, and sides to accept the



pegboard back. (There's also one more groove in the bottom for a hard-board lip.)

Some options for tool holders are shown in the last graphic. You can design these parts to hold the tools you have. ✂
